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### Review: Last year's aims and outcomes

Aim	Outcome
Attendance	Attendance for children eligible for pupil premium was lower than that for non-pupil premium children. New focus/approach required through employment of family link worker
Progress of PP children	At the end of KS2 there was a positive progress score for PP children in maths and so a real success. In writing progress for PP children was roughly in line. In reading the progress score was -2.1. Whilst disappointing it must be noted that all PP children made good progress in terms of grades e.g. all level 2s achieved EXS.
Targeted Support	All key actions were completed and this ensured key interventions were put into place.
Overall	A pupil premium review was commissioned for the September 2019. This provided a range of actions to support the effectiveness of the pupil premium strategy. These actions will feed into this 3 year strategic plan.
